I have been asked by Dumile Feni to write you this letter with regards to your daughters, Sophia and Mariam's education prospects in the United States. He is anxious that various steps be taken immediately to enable him to submit their applications to the American Committee on Africa at the United Nations.

In the first place he would like you to provide him with all relevant information on your daughters' education progress in South Africa. Secondly he would like this information as soon as possible to enable the Committee to process the applications which will enable your daughters to begin school here at the beginning of 1988. Thirdly when sending this information please send only photocopies and not the originals. He hopes to submit all the relevant information to a Mr Khumalo who sits on this Committee which will then enable him to process their applications for Scholarships for South African children. This information will be required well before January 1988 if they are to start school here in 1988. It is therefore essential that this important matter be dealt with urgently.

Information Required

- 1. What examinations both children have taken so far and the grades and results they have achieved.
- What subjects they have or taking at present give full details.
- 3. What results if any were achieved on each subject. Perhaps two references mights be of some use; namely (i) Academic (ii) Character.
- 4. What has been happening to both children's education since the various disruptions at school as the case might be. As we are aware schooling in South Africa has been disrupted on numerous occasions and it would be useful to give a fuller picture of these disruptions.

Once all this information has been collected please send it immediately to Dumile at the above address who will then forward the same to Mr Khumalo of the American Committee on Africa at the United Nations. I must emphasise that time is of the essence in this matter and the sooner such information is received the quicker it will be dealt with.

Dumile on his part wishes me to inform you that once he receives this information he will make arrangements for the children to come over here late this year to allow themselves time to get used to the American way of life. This he will possibly manage sometime in November or December.
